

# **Terminology**


## **Provincial Flood Hazard Terminology**

Flood fringe: land that would likely experience shallow water depths (<1m) with velocities slower than 1m/s

Floodway: land that would typically experience flooding depths >1m or velocities faster than 1m/s

# 1875 Event (excerpt)

Extract from copy of letter from Henry J. Moberly, clerk in charge of Fort McMurray, to Chief Trader Roderick MacFarlane, officer in charge of Athabasca District at Fort Chipewyan, dated Fort McMurray, 25 April 1875.

'I have now the painful duty to perform of letting you know that we have had a very sudden Inundation here, a few days ago, accompanied by serious loss to the Hudson's Bay Company.

On the 20 Instant about 2 hours after daylight, the river suddenly gave signs of breaking up and in half an hour from that time the water had risen about 60 feet, and the whole place was flooded - the water and ice passing with fearful rapidity and carrying off everything before them. We had just time to escape to the hill, in our immediate vicinity, with the families, bedding and a little Provisions and Ammunition, and to throw up stairs the Furs and most of the valuable property, when the water was already rushing through the Fort. From the time the river first gave signs of starting hardly half an hour elapsed before there was 5 feet of water in the highest building in the Fort, and the Interpreter's house was carried bodily away and dashed to pieces in the Woods; the Workshop and Men's houses have been almost destroyed.

# **Provincial Policy**

# Alberta Flood Recovery and Reconstruction Act – Bill 27


- Came into force in December 2013, pre-Horse River Wildfire
- Allows for regulation powers to control, regulate or prohibit any use or development in a floodway
- Regulations have not been enacted

# **Current Municipal Policy**

#### Land Use Bylaw Amendment (Nov 26/13)

- In response to anticipated legislation, the Municipality amended the Land Use Bylaw
- Habitable areas allowed above 1:100 ice jam flood level
- Non-habitable areas are allowed below the 1:100 ice jam flood level

# Flood Mitigation Planning

- In 2007 Municipal Council approved Flood Mitigation to an elevation of 248.5 m (1 in 40 year ice jam)
- Currently Prairie Loop Boulevard and Saline Creek Drive are built to the 1 in 40 year elevation to provide flood mitigation
- Updated Flood Mitigation Strategy began fall 2013 (1 in 100 year ice jam) in response to Provincial Legislation


# **Flood Mitigation Planning**

 Traditional earthworks mitigation of a combination of elevated roadways, trails, floodwalls and floodgates, and built up development to provide a perimeter dike was considered

# **Flood Mitigation Costs - Analysis**

- Total project cost of \$207M is maximum cost estimate, of traditional flood mitigation methods, for the purpose of applying for grant funding through Alberta Community Resilience Program
- Total project cost is the INCREMENTAL cost to increase flood protection from 248.5 m (underway pre-2013) to 250.0 m (required after 2013 for Government of Alberta

# **Alberta Community Resilience Program**

- Cost-sharing Per Project Dollar Value
  - 90% of first \$3 million
  - 70% of costs > \$3 million

- 3-year \$325 million Provincial grant program
  - Year 1 \$110 million
  - Year 2 \$110 million
  - Year 3 \$105 million

# Recent Council Resolution History

# **April 14, 2015 Council Meeting**

- Request one year deferral from GOA in implementing flood mitigation while alternative solutions are investigated
- Place design and construction of flood mitigation and Prairie Loop Boulevard on hold pending deferral request resolution with GOA

### **November 3, 2015 Council Meeting**

- Complete Flood Mitigation and Prairie Loop Boulevard to 248.5m, while GOA updates its Flood Hazard Analysis.
- When Flood Hazard Analysis is updated, Administration is to update Flood Mitigation plan with recommendation to proceed or not to the elevation required by the GOA.
- Administration to send letter summarizing impact of Flood Hazard Analysis on Municipality's Flood Mitigation Plan, access to grant flooding and access to disaster assistance in the event of a flood.

### **Current Status**

- Municipal Land Use Bylaw requiring flood proofing is in effect for re-builds if property is located in Flood Hazard Area
- Provincial Regulation exempting Fort McMurray from Development Ban in Floodways is not enacted
- Flood Mitigation pre-design/design for 1 in 100 year elevation (250 m) is currently deferred by Council: pre-design on alternative mitigation (demountable flood walls) cannot advance
- Flood Mitigation to 1 in 40 year elevation (248.5 m) continues to advance as per Council's direction

#### **Administrative Recommendations:**

- 1. THAT Administration be directed to:
  - (a) proceed with an inaugural event to recognize the numerous individuals involved in the first 100 hours of the 2016 wildfire event, and allocate any needed funds from the existing Council budget;
  - (b) investigate opportunities for the creation of a commemorative landmark to recognize the significance of the 2016 wildfire events, and the heroic efforts of those involved in fighting it; and
  - (c) develop a Council Policy for a long-term commendation program for Council's consideration.
- 2. THAT all costs associated with the proposed Commendation Program incurred in 2016 be funded from:
  - (a) the 2016 Regional Council Operating Budget;
  - (b) the 2016 corporate-wide Operating Budget; or
  - (c) the Emerging Issues Reserve, in that order.

#### **Summary and Background:**

On May 3, 2016, many areas of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo were devastated by wildfire. More than 2000 homes were lost to the fire, and thousands of residents were forced to make a rapid evacuation from the community. During the first 100 hours of the wildfire event, heroic efforts were made to save lives and homes and to stop the fire. Numerous individuals, including first responders, emergency services personnel, municipal employees, industry partners and contractors, and citizens/volunteers, participated in this effort and should be recognized accordingly.

At the present time, the Municipality does not have a policy to govern such recognition; therefore, it is suggested that Council consider creating a Commendation Program to award and recognize individuals for deeds or acts of service or valor that is outstanding, exceptional and beyond the expected normal call of duty.

Despite the lack of approved policy, the extraordinary and heroic efforts of those involved in battling the wildfire, and particularly in the first 100 hours of the event, should be formally recognized at the earliest possible opportunity. It is proposed that such recognition would occur at a public event, with honorees being presented with a citation and lapel pin. It is also proposed

that a formalized policy be developed and implemented, with clearly established eligibility criteria, be developed to guide any such future events.

#### **Budget/Financial Implications:**

The cost of the inaugural event is expected to be approximately \$15,000-\$25,000, and can be accommodated within the approved 2016 Regional Council Operating Budget.

#### **Rationale for Recommendations:**

The 2016 wildfire events that devastated our Municipality also highlighted the incredible bravery, heroism, dedication and sheer tenacity of a number of individuals. These individuals have received media attention locally, provincially, nationally and globally, but have not been formally recognized for their extraordinary efforts. The proposed Council Commendation Program would serve to provide the level of formal recognition to these individuals, but would also establish a clear foundation to award and recognize anyone whose actions are outstanding, exceptional and beyond the expected normal call of duty.

**Subject: Municipal Landfill – Extension to Waiver of Tipping Fees**

#### **Administrative Recommendation:**

THAT the June 28, 2016 resolution regarding the Wood Buffalo Recovery Committee Recommendation – Landfill and Waste Management Matters be amended by deleting from section (b), the words "...July 31, 2016," and replacing it with "October 31, 2016."

#### **Summary:**

Administration recommends that residential landfill tipping fees be waived until October 31, 2016, to facilitate cleanup efforts and provide residents with properties in the restricted areas equal opportunity and resources to those residents that were able to return to their properties and commence cleanup upon initial re-entry beginning on June 1.

Residential waste is waste material brought to the landfill in residential vehicles, including small amounts of demolition and renovation materials, (e.g., items impacted by smoke, fire or flooding). Any company removing demolition or renovation materials under contract is deemed as commercial as they use commercial-sized vehicles.

#### **Background:**

During the Provincial State of Emergency, beginning on May 4, 2016, residential landfill tipping fees were waived until June 30, to accommodate the removal of household waste from residences damaged by the wildfire or during firefighting activities.

Subsequent to the decision to waive residential tipping fees, the Wood Buffalo Recovery Committee brought forward a recommendation to Council on June 28, 2016, which resulted in the following resolution being passed:

"(a) that Administration be directed to open the Municipal Landfill to incoming waste on a 24 hour per day, 7 day per week basis commencing July 5, 2016 until cleanup and removal of debris from structures destroyed or damaged by fire or by firefighting activities is substantially complete, and to take such measures and procure such equipment as may be required (including if necessary one or more temporary truck scales) to provide for rapid and safe turnaround of vehicles at the Landfill in anticipation of substantially increased volumes of traffic during the demolition and cleanup phase;

- (b) that Administration be directed to maintain in place until July 31, 2016 the waiver of tipping fees for loads of household waste hauled to the landfill;
- (c) that Administration be directed to take immediate steps to block vehicular access to areas of the Municipality that are notorious for their use as unlawful waste dumping sites
- (d) that Administration be directed to include all costs associated with (a) through (c) above in its request to the Government of Alberta for funding to compensate for extraordinary costs arising from the wildfire."

The augmented service hours began on July 5, 2016, until cleanup activities are substantially complete.

#### **Alternatives:**

- 1. Reinstate residential landfill tipping fees effective August 3, 2016.
- 2. Waive residential landfill tipping fees until September 30, 2016, for loads of household waste hauled to the landfill from the restricted neighborhoods: Abasand, Beacon Hill, and Waterways.
- 3. Waive residential landfill tipping fees until October 31, 2016, for loads of household waste hauled to the landfill from the restricted neighborhoods: Abasand, Beacon Hill, and Waterways.

#### **Budget/Financial Implications:**

Based on a summary of materials received at the landfill from May 16 until July 27, 2016, the financial implications of waiving residential landfill tipping fees has been calculated at approximately \$640,066 in uncollected tipping fees.

Should Council choose to extend the waiver of tipping fees until October 31, the additional financial implication is estimated at \$227,000 based on historical data from this timeframe in 2015.

The total approximate value of uncollected tipping fees for the entire period running from May 16 until October 31, 2016, is estimated at \$867,000. The modification of operation hours of the landfill to a 24 hour per day, 7 day per week basis is also expected to impact the total amount of uncollected tipping fees.

#### **Rationale for Recommendation:**

Demolition is now underway in the restricted and non-restricted areas following the 2016 Wildfire. As there are a significant number of properties that can be occupied in the restricted areas, the recommendation to waive tipping fees until October, 31, 2016, will allow equal opportunity for all residents in the cleanup process, facilitate the removal of waste and debris, and reduce the financial pressures facing affected residents.

For the good of the community as a whole, Administration recommends that residential tipping fees be waived as this will provide further incentive to remove debris, and help to mitigate the immediate danger and unsightliness that arises from the ongoing presence of destroyed properties.

#### **Subject: Small and Medium Business Recovery Support Funding**

#### **Administrative Recommendations:**

- 1. That Council approve the transfer of \$10M uncommitted funds from the Capital Infrastructure Reserve to the Emerging Issues Reserve.
- 2. That Council approve the allocation of \$15 Million from the Emerging Issues Reserve to *Small and Medium Business Recovery Support*.

#### **Summary:**

In response to the 3,900 plus businesses impacted by the 2016 Alberta Fire, *Small and Medium Business Recovery Support* is being developed to support Small to Medium Enterprises (SME) within the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo (RMWB). Businesses will benefit substantially from a \$15 million RMWB contribution to ensure appropriate supports are available to them during this recovery phase.

#### **Background:**

As a result of the 2016 Alberta Wildfires, 100% of all businesses within the region have been impacted at some level by the disaster (e.g., fire and smoke damage, loss of revenue, employment issues, cash flow issues, etc.) and require help to recover their operations.

Small and Medium Business Recovery Support was initiated post-fire and will benefit SME's within the RMWB, defined as 50 employees or less. Details are currently being structured to best suit the needs of the business community and to achieve the mandate of providing support to business recovery efforts and economic viability, a key pillar in community sustainability.

Through the Wood Buffalo Business Recovery Hotline (attachment 1), stakeholder meetings, and during Government of Alberta Ministry Roundtables in May and July; the overall challenges many businesses are currently facing include:

- Cash flow;
- Stable employee base;
- Reluctance to take on additional debt in the form of a loan, due to the risks of operating in a post-disaster environment; and
- Challenges of Alberta's economic slowdown prior to the disaster.

Author: Amanda Haitas & Kelly Hansen Department: Economic Development & REOC As identified in the *Business and Economic Recovery Plan* approved by Council May 25, 2016, providing 'emergency relief for business' is a priority. To date, the Canadian Red Cross has issued Phase 1 of their business funding program, giving qualifying businesses \$1,000.00. Although this has already benefited many businesses, additional and greater monetary supports are needed.

#### **Alternative:**

Do not approve the allocation of \$15 million from the Emerging Issues Reserve to *Small and Medium Business Recovery Support*.

#### **Budget/Financial Implications:**

A transfer of \$10M of uncommitted funds from the Capital Infrastructure Reserve to the Emerging Issues Reserve is required prior to the consideration of the \$15 million allocation from the Emerging Issues Reserve to the 2016 Operational Budget in order to retain the minimum balance of \$50M as per the Fiscal Management Policy FIN -160.

#### **Rationale for Recommendation:**

SME's within the region play a critical role in economic recovery by providing services and products to our residents and other businesses, and providing employment opportunities. This is especially crucial in a remote northern community, where access to products and services is a challenge. During this post-fire environment, providing business support to SMEs is essential in spurring recovery efforts and achieving economic viability for the region.





#### Do you have a RMWB business license?




#### Was your business affected by the wildfires?











#### Have you laid off or terminated any employees post disaster?






Do you have business insurance?




Does your business insurance cover fire, smoke damage losses?







Does your business insurance cover loss of income, inventory and or interruption of business?



Subject: Selection Committee Recommendations – Mid-Term Committee Appointments

#### **Selection Committee Recommendations:**

THAT Doug Fingland be appointed to the Community Services Committee effective immediately to December 31, 2017; and

THAT Scott Garner be appointed to the Advisory Committee on Aging, representing Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation, effective immediately to December 31, 2016.

#### **Summary:**

The Selection Committee has made recommendations pertaining to vacancies existing currently on the Community Services Committee and the Advisory Committee on Aging. In keeping with established bylaws, the appointment of individuals must be approved by Council.

#### **Background:**

The Municipality has received formal notification of vacancies on the Community Services Committee and the Advisory Committee on Aging (more specifically, the Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation's board member representative on the Advisory Committee on Aging).

When the Selection Committee held its meeting in November 2015, to review applications received as part of the annual boards and committees recruitment campaign, they identified individuals for a waitlist in the event that mid-term vacancies occurred. As such, the waitlisted individual identified at that time for the Community Services Committee was contacted to confirm their continued interest in serving as a volunteer on this Committee. With Mr. Fingland's continued interest, the Selection Committee is recommending his appointment to Council.

In addition, the Municipality has received a written recommendation from the Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation pertaining to the appointment of one of their current board members to the Advisory Committee on Aging. The Selection Committee has reviewed this recommendation and is therefore supporting the appointment of Mr. Garner to the Advisory Committee on Aging.

#### **Rationale for Recommendations:**

The appointment of replacement members to the Community Services Committee and the Advisory Committee on Aging is necessary to ensure their continued viability.
