# Petition to create a Bylaw to Prohibit performances involving animals in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo

This petition is asking Mayor Melissa Blake and council of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo to create a new bylaw that Prohibits performances where any animal is required to perform tricks, fight or participate in performances for the amusement or entertainment of an audience.











- Open-mouthed breathing can be a sign that an elephant is in pain.
- Bringing their ears forward and extending them out from the head, spraying water or dirt, and using their trunks to throw objects at people can all be signs of aggression.
- Look for signs of "stereotypic" behavior—rocking, swaying, head-bobbing, or other repetitive movement. Stereotypic behavior is a sign of psychological distress.

• Crossing their legs may indicate irritation and itching caused by chaining, a stomach ache, and/or joint pain.

### Prohibition against causing distress

2(1) No person shall cause or permit an animal of which the person is the owner or the person in charge to be or to continue to be in distress.



Section 2.1 ANIMAL PROTECTION ACT

RSA 2000 Chapter A-41

- (1.1) No person shall cause an animal to be in distress.
- (2) This section does not apply if the distress results from an activity carried on in accordance with the regulations or in accordance with reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal care, management, husbandry, hunting, fishing, trapping, pest control or slaughter.

RSA 2000 cA-41 s2;2005 c22 s3

### **Administrative Recommendations:**

THAT Administration work with the Trans Canada Trail Foundation to link the Trans Canada Trail to the trail system in the Regional Municipality;

THAT the estimated cost of \$500,000 to be incurred in 2018, to complete the linkage to the Trans Canada Trail, be included by Administration in the 5 year capital plan for consideration by Council; and

THAT the Mayor be added to the list of other Mayors throughout Alberta and Canada who are declared "Champions" of the Trans Canada Trail.

### **Summary:**

The Trans Canada Trail is a multi-use recreational trail, made up of hundreds of local trails through Canada. The Athabasca River Valley is currently designated as the Trans Canada Trail link in Fort McMurray. The Trail offers Canadians and international visitors a unique way to explore major cities and small towns, experience our ever-changing landscapes, and discover Canada's rich history, diverse cultures, communities and people.

### **Background:**

In August 2015, the Trans Canada Trail Foundation invited Mayor Blake to champion and recognize the Trans Canada Trail in Fort McMurray. The Trans Canada Trail seeks to be one of the world's pre-eminent long-distance trails. Continuous links throughout the country have formed one of the world's longest and grandest trails.

The Athabasca River Valley has been designated as the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo's connection to the Trans Canada Trail system.

### **Budget/Financial Implications:**

The Trans Canada Trail Foundation will match funding up to \$500,000 available in 2018. Capital funding of \$500,000 for 2018 will be required to develop trail linkage, perform trail improvements, and add amenities (signage, mapping, benches, scenic lookouts, and a gazebo or arbor). Public consultation will be required to identify the location of the trail and the preferred

amenities. There is opportunity to coordinate this project with other ongoing municipal trail projects.

### **Rationale for Recommendations:**

The Trans Canada Trail offers a multitude of trail experiences from wilderness pathways, country roads, logging roads, rail beds, forested trails, rivers, historic canoe routes to paved urban walkways, downtown streets, and secondary highways. The Trail is designed to accommodate walking/hiking, cycling, horseback riding, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and canoeing.


# Sustainable Development Committee Report Trans Canada Trail


