



Purpose


RMWB is preparing a new Municipal Development Plan (MDP) to reflect changes in the social, cultural, and economic conditions of the region.

The new MDP will be created with input from residents throughout Wood Buffalo to ensure it reflects local values, opportunities, and challenges, and sets a clear vision for the Region's future.



Why is it important?

- » The 2011 MDP growth projections indicated that Wood Buffalo's population would grow to over 230,000 people by 2030
- » This growth has not happened due to several factors, including the 2013 floods, the 2014 global drop in oil prices and resulting economic downturn, the 2016 Horse River Wildfire, and the 2020 floods
- In response to changing social and economic environments, the Municipality has taken this opportunity to reflect today's conditions through a new MDP





"GRAHAME, SS" *not used	Hudson's Bay Company sternwheel steamer was built in Fort Chipewyan in 1883 and ran in the early days of Fort McMurray from Fort Chipewyan to Fort McMurray then on to reach the supplies that were still being hauled over Portage La Loche. The boat was constructed of timber from Fort Chipewyan and crafted under the strict supervision of Captain John McKenzie Smith. It was 130 feet long and 24 feet wide and was designed to haul freight, although it did provide the odd passenger transportation. The Grahame had an insatiable appetite for wood and could consume a bundle of wood the width of a small room in half an hour, thus creating a new industry in Fort McMurray, lumber jacking. Scores of men were hired to chop wood in the surrounding area of Fort McMurray.

Victor was directly involved with the assessment of the various locations for the Rotary Club lease and presented the current location to Alberta Cabinet resulting in the granting of the current Rotary Lease. As the Northeastern Alberta Commissioner Mr. Henning's role and his impact on the growth of Fort McMurray is profound and it would be great acknowledgement to his legacy for the sub-division to bear his name. Ballfield named after "Tip" who was an avid ballplayer in the late 60's and 70's. Moved to Fort McMurray around 1964 from Uranium City and opened a hardware store in the Peter Pond Strip Mall. Later on, Tip started a Ford dealership and Bettyann opened a different hardware chain in Thickwood Plaza. Tip was very active in the community, President of Chamber of Commerce and a founding member of the Kinsmen Club.
HODGINS — *not used (Avenue)	Milt Hodgins was a resident of Fort McMurray from the late 1970's to the early 90's. He was an entrepreneur managing an auto rental franchise and later in print media advertising. He was a President (1989) and member of the Fort McMurray Rotary Club, serving on numerous committees including the Rotary Radio-Thon; a fundraiser for Rotary House. Milt was the visionary in bringing the Rotary Classic Golf Tournament, a CPGA event, to Fort McMurray from 1988 to 1990.
HOFFMAN, Dr. G. *not used	A chemist who worked for the Geological Survey of Canada. Hoffman exposed the oilsand to European techniques and published his findings in 1883. Although Hoffman held out hope that the source of oil in the region could be found, he did focus scientists' attention on the potential for oil to be extracted from existing deposits. He worked closely with Robert Bell to conclude that substantial scientific resources were required to extract a relatively small amount of oil. His effort in oilsand extraction set a foundation for future development.
