These funds also assist with the purchase of arts, crafts and helps us to organize activities such as dance, hockey, baseball, and games night.

Funding help with additional costs for instructors to come out to Saprae Creek for programs such as Home Alone, Bear Smart Safety, First Aid.

Saprae Creek Residents Society hopes that by having events and youth programs residents will enjoy living in the Fort McMurray/ Saprae Creek region. We also support Vista Ridge, local artists, and small businesses for our activities which in turn provides them with revenue to remain in business and stay in the area.

	The board strongly feels that if we use Vista Ridge by having youth activities there, they will encourage their parents to purchase season passes to continue to support this facility year round.

The Saprae Creek Residents Society measures the programs sucess by how many residents attend and their comments to the volunteers. We also ask for suggestions to make events and programs more successful.

Since we are located in Saprae Creek, we do not overlap with any other programs offered in the area. Residents prefer to attend a local event of activity so they don't have to drive to the city as often.

We are also unique in that we have a ski hill close by and so promoting activities with Vista Ridge, our youth become familiar with the staff and often want to go skiing or snowboarding with them. In 2020 we hope to expand that to golf at the new course which will be open next summer.

SCRS promotes the programs though the Saprae Creek Facebook page, by word of mouth, and the community newsletter.

We partner with Vista Ridge All Seasons Park where possible, in helping them with developing the area so that many residents will enjoy the benefits this park brings to our neighbourhood. This upcoming year we look forward to the new golf course and bike course. SCRS will provide funds from our casino funds for bike racks.

Saprae Creek Residents Society donates casino funds to the Wood Buffalo Safe Community for the bike safety programs they provide to our youth.

We also help to support the Wood Buffalo Food Bank from casino funds.

Volunteers are involved in community programs using the signup genius page where we request help with a list of tasks such as help to set up an event, cleanup afterwards, as well as supervising if required.
