We are applying to the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo for a grant to support the Program Facilitator position at Pastew Place Detox Centre. The Program Facilitator is responsible for delivering a 5-day program ('Day Program') which explores the impact of addiction, physically, psychologically and spiritually. It explores relationships, families, relapse prevention and goal setting. In addition, the Program Facilitator provides one-on-one support for clients, which involves making community referrals for, ongoing counselling, and to other community agencies. The role of Program Facilitator is a pivotal role at Pastew Place; this position positively motivates change and influences individuals within our community and surrounding areas to make healthy decisions as well as provides clients with education, support, and connections within our community.

This initiative supports the target area of Mental Health and Addiction. The role of the Program Facilitator supports Pastew Place in providing not only a safe place for vulnerable individuals to detoxify from the effects of substances, but also in connecting and referring individuals to agencies that will further support their recovery from addiction. On many occasions, clients participating in the Day Program have expressed details on trauma that has played a role with their addiction. This may include but is not limited to those growing up in abusive families, suffering great loss at a young age and living in Residential Schools. The emotional impact these factors contribute to their life struggles is huge. Many turn to addiction as a way of numbing themselves from a very painful life. By supporting the role of Program Facilitator at Pastew Place, the RMWB will be providing opportunities for individuals to understand the impact that addiction has had on their lives, while taking the necessary and difficult steps towards recovery and healthy re-integration into their communities. Many of our indigenous clientel deside that more treatment programming is what the need to heal and change they way they are living their lives. This is where we would refer to treatment programs that offer cultural specific programming to deal with and trama or intergenerational trama they are dealing with. As clients begin exploring their addictions through education and support, their recovery impacts families and communities at large. By supporting our clients at Pastew Place, the RMWB is supporting healthy families in our community, and reducing the strain on health care, judicial and social systems.

The goal of the Day Program is to educate and to positively motive change in individuals. Majority of clients taking our Day Program are in the pre-contemplation or contemplative
stages of change. Meaning they are slightly thinking about changing how they live their lives
or not at all. Our goal is that the individuals in these stages gain enough knowledge and feel
supported and encouraged enough to move into the Preparation and Action stages. This is
where we hope to see our clients make the big decision to enter into a residential treatment facility and get the help they need to deal with the traumas that they have experienced in
their lives, and build the tools and coping strategies, so that they can live happily as
productive members of our community.

With regards to the Program Facilitator's position itself outcomes will be based on the Executive Directors direct employee evaluations as well as client feedback surveys. When individuals take the Day Program we ask them to complete an entrance and exit survey. This is to determine what knowledge and impact the program had on them and also if they felt the information was helpful and were satisfied with the way the information was facilitated. Statistical data on how many individuals complete the Day Program will also be tracked.

Our Day Program is the only program that is tailored to clients who are in the pre-contemplation or contemplative stages of addiction.

Fort McMurray is a small community but has a wealth of community agencies. Working with these agencies is crucial for the client in order to develop a network of support before, during and after treatment. Although there is not one particular agency we work with directly on a continuous bases, each play an integral role in helping the client achieve a healthy and happy life. Some of the organizations we work with on a regular basis are:

The Salvation Army: provide money for client's prescriptions, transportation to treatment and vouchers for personal items.

The Centre of Hope: provide transportation to appointments for clients and help with getting identification if needed

Alberta Works: provide money for transportation to treatment and cover associated costs with the expenses of attending treatment.

NADAP - provide money to Aboriginal individuals for treatment and related expenses Mark Amy Treatment Centre - Local treatment Centre that is utilized by our pre-treatment clients

AHS Addictions/Mental Health - An addiction counsellor from AHS comes to the Detox Centre weekly to meet with clients who are interested in treatment

STHT - works with our client to provide housing

Choices - assists clients with their resume and job search

Waypoints - Provided various services in the community including a women's shelter

36. Provide any additional information that may assist in developing a better understanding of the organization or its services/programs during the grant review:

Pastew Place Detox Centre Society was incorporated under the societies act on September 12th, 1979. Pastew Place is a non-medical detox Centre that ensures individuals withdrawing from drugs and/or alcohol and doing so in a safe and monitored environment. Prior to 2008, we only offered a 5-7-day detox program. After assessing community needs and gaps in services to an individual's recovery, we introduced both the Pre-Treatment and the Post treatment program. We have also added an educational component (Day Program) to our programming as we believe knowledge is power.

On May 1st 2016 the center was evacuated due to the wildfire. Miraculously the Centre survived the fire and re-opened at the end of July. For the first month we were seeing occupancy rates similar to before the fire and then in September 2016, we were continually full. We were in a situation where we had to support more individuals with less financial resources. With a position being eliminated in April due to funding cuts this increase in clients was putting a large strain on staff. In order to alleviate this strain, we applied for and successfully received fire recovery funding to support that position. The approved funding was for the 2017/2018 year and we are currently in the process of securing funding in order to support it in the upcoming year.

Pastew Place had many changes in its life span and these are just a few of the many transitions and challenges it has been through. We have faced many obstacles but have seen so much more successes. From starting out as a small 10 bed detox facility to a 16-bed center that offers wrap around service. Services that help people transform their lives from desperation and hopelessness to healthy productive members of our community.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Pastew Place Detox Centre Society (the Society), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2019, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Society as at March 31, 2019, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Society in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with those requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Society's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Society's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Pastew Place Detox Centre Society ("the Society") was incorporated under the Societies Act of Alberta and is registered as a charitable organization with the Canada Revenue Agency, and as such is exempt from taxes. Its purpose is to assist persons within the community with drug and alcohol rehabilitation.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Revenue Recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions and related interest are recognized in revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. The Society's deferred contributions consist of unexpended revenue from casinos and Alberta Health Services. Unrestricted contributions and other revenue are recognized in revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

The Society receives a major portion of its funding under two agreements with Alberta Health Services and the United Way of Fort McMurray. These funding agreements provide funding for programs and services. Any unspent funding under both funding agreements for supported programs is repayable.

Contributed Materials and Services

Contributions of materials are recognized as contributions and expenses in the statement of operations when a fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials are used in the normal course of the Society's operations and would otherwise have been purchased. No amounts have been recognized in the year.

Cash

Cash is comprised of cash held in financial institutions.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization. Property and equipment is amortized over its estimated useful life at the following rates and methods:

Building improvements	4%	declining balance method
Furniture and fixtures	20%	declining balance method
Automotive	30%	declining balance method
Computer equipment	55%	declining balance method

The Society regularly reviews its property and equipment to eliminate obsolete items.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Measurement Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Society is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the Society's risk exposure and concentration as of March 31, 2019.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Society is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its funders and donors, and other related sources including accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

9. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The Society's primary sources of revenue is funding from Alberta Health Services and the United Way of Fort McMurray. The grant funding can be cancelled if the Society does not observe certain established guidelines. The Society's ability to continue viable operations is dependent upon following the criteria within stated guidelines. As at the date of these financial statements, the Society believes that it is in compliance with these guidelines.
