Call to Order

Mayor Blake called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m.

1. Council Meeting – February 24, 2009

Delegations

2. Mrs. Noha El Banna re: Justin Slade Youth Foundation Annual Update

Mrs. Noha El Banna presented an update to Council on the Justin Slade Youth Foundation's successes thus far and future initiatives they plan to undertake. She explained the Foundation caters to a diverse clientele with varying ages and backgrounds. Their target age group is 12-18 years old, for which the Foundation hopes to provide a safe space for youth to be nurtured and feel empowered. In the year ahead, the Foundation plans to initiate leadership programs, classes on web design, art workshops, and two events a year to showcase participants' work. Of the 1,758 clients, that visited the centre last year, 50% were "low risk," 35% were "medium risk," and 15% were "high risk." The average time spent at the centre is three to four hours, which means at-risk youth spent more than 6,700 hours off the streets and in a positive, empowering environment. This year, the Foundation will try to initiate more funding channels, looking for an increased funding capacity from previous partners (municipal and provincial governments and the United Way) as well as hoping to secure federal funding.

3. Mr. Bryan Lutes, President, Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation re: Request to Enter into Construction Mortgage

Mr. Bryan Lutes advised that Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation (WBHDC) is continuing its efforts to fulfill the mandate of constructing The Cascades at Meadow Creek Village using a mortgage not to exceed \$9,070,000. The funds will help facilitate the construction of 45 apartments in Timberlea and the development includes five eight-plex buildings. Construction is scheduled to begin in April and the WBHDC plans on completing the project by early 2010. After completion of the project, the market value of the site is expected to be \$12,200,000. On behalf of the Wood Buffalo Housing and Development Corporation, Mr. Lutes requested Council approve the mortgage so construction can begin next month.

Other Delegations

Mayor Blake asked if anyone present in the gallery wished to speak to a topic on the evening's agenda.

Mr. Sean Graham – Request for the Banning of Plastic Shopping Bags

Mr. Graham, resident, returned to Council after first bringing forward the possibility of banning plastic bags in the Municipality in 2007. He explained that even though some plastic bags are in fact recyclable, it costs \$4,000 to recycle one tonne of bags that is then worth only \$34. He maintained that if a ban were to be put in place, he would hope the focus would be on retail businesses in the Municipality and not about enforcing and criminalizing individual citizens who may bring bags from other municipalities into the area. Over two months last summer, Mr. Graham alone collected 2,268 signatures from community members supporting the plastic bag ban. He also received guaranteed support from eight local businesses. He explained that communities in Australia as well as Canadian cities Vancouver and Calgary are also considering

the ban and if Council were to move forward with such legislation, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo would be the largest—and one of the first—municipalities in Canada to do so. Mr. Graham believes the ban would help bring positive feedback to a community that is often plagued by negative press regarding environmental concerns.

Ms. Veronique Rensonnet – Request for the Banning of Plastic Shopping Bags

Ms. Veronique Rensonnet, resident, spoke to Council, voicing concern with the Administration's recommendation, claiming she has found some additional statistics that support the banning of plastic shopping bags. She maintains that if the plastic bag ban were to be passed, the concern of mixing plastic and biodegradable bags in the landfill would no longer be an issue. She believes that the Municipality's relative geographical isolation would perhaps make it easier to enforce the ban. Manitoba's Leaf Rapids started with a one-year levy on plastic bags, followed by a full ban and so far, Ms. Rensonnet claims the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. She argued that since so many cities around the world (including municipalities in the United Kingdom, Belgium, and Corsica) have already enacted the ban, the Regional Municipality can look to those successes to model legislation after.

Administrative Update

Darcy Elder, General Manager, Public Works – Recycling Education and Awareness

Mr. Darcy Elder provided an update to Council on the Recycling Education and Awareness Campaign. The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo has been actively recycling since 2005 with Suncor Energy as a corporate sponsor. The campaign focuses on educating people to reduce and reuse as many items as they can. Through the contributions and cooperation of the Municipality's citizens, Mr. Elder calculates that 2,000 tonnes of recyclable material have been diverted from entering the landfill, saving approximately \$250,000 in landfill costs. The growth rate of the campaign has sustained itself, as the amount of material recycled has only increased since the inception of the project. 2008 saw the campaign expand on traditional promotional methods, including Environment and Waste Reduction Weeks as well as seasonal advertising, and partnering with schools to educate about the benefits of recycling. The RRRibbitt program has also been updated and through 2009, Mr. Elder hopes to engage more people in recycling efforts through a new online RRRibbitt game. Television and print ads are also slated to make appearances in the municipality throughout the year. Looking ahead to 2010, Mr. Elder plans to take advantages to the changes made in product lines once local sorting comes on-stream late that year. Mr. Elder then presented an award to Mayor Blake and Suncor representative Brenda Erskine as the 2008 Recycling Education and Awareness campaign received top honours from the International Association of Business Communication, a worldwide establishment dealing with excellence in communications. The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo's promotional campaign received a score of 9.38/10, garnering the Municipality the highest award classification, Award of Excellence. The effectiveness of the campaign is a result of the hard work and dedication from the Municipality, the partners involved, and the citizens of this region.
