5.1. Flower of The Year - Seed Distribution Update

Destiny Jefferies, Committee Member, provided an update on the discounted table offered by the YMM Urban Farmer's Market, to distribute seed packets. The Committee agreed April would be the best time to participate in the Market and this would also serve as a good opportunity to pass out more information about the Committee.

Seville Kwan, Department Administrator, shared the draft of the "Flower of the Year" seed packet, different ideas to enhance the seed packet were discussed among members.

5.2. Communities in Bloom Garden Planting

Seville Kwan, Department Administrator, confirmed this year's Summer Garden will be planted at Borealis Park, the date will be weather dependent. It was also indicated that the deadline to incorporate yellow flowers for the garden was missed and suggested that the Committee explore other options to incorporate yellow in to the garden.

5.3. Nominate Your Neighbour

Seville Kwan, Department Administrator, indicated that the Nominate Your Neighbour Summer edition program for this year will run from June 15 - August 15, 2021. The Committee discussed working with the Communications Department to explore different opportunities and activities to promote the Nominate your Neighbour Summer edition program on Social Media. Phase 2 – Objectives

- 1. To retain existing businesses, while encouraging new businesses in the Downtown.
- 2. To introduce new features & amenities that create interest, improve accessibility, enhance safety, and increase vibrancy, helping to transform the Downtown into a place people want to spend time.
- 3. To enhance the aesthetic qualities of private buildings and property to improve the character and quality of the Downtown
- 4. To leverage public funding to catalyze private investment in the Downtown.

To encourage business owners to enhance their storefronts with displays, lighting, planters and other improvements.



Who is this geared to?

- commercial, institutional and mixed-use buildings
- operators with a ground-level storefront (i.e., entrance or windows)

Phase 2 Changes:

- Refocus to ground-level storefronts
- \$1,500 per business
- One contractor estimate and/or project budget
- A more focused list of eligible work

Eligible work includes:



Storefront window displays, including platforms, shelving and display units



Window graphics and other transparent decorations



Accent, winter and holiday lighting

Eligible work includes:



Temporary displays and artwork in vacant storefronts



Planters, baskets, flowers and similar items



Sidewalk signage ("sandwich board" signs)

2021 Flower of the Year

Jewel Mix Nasturtiums

PLANTING:

- Start seeds indoors 2-4 weeks before transplanting, or sow outdoors 1-2 weeks after last frost.
- Plant seeds 1.4 inch deep in well-drained regular soil.
- Transplant seedlings outdoors after last frost.
- Plant seedings 6-12 inches apart.
- Select a sunny, or lightly shaded location.

CARE:

Water plant regularly.

ABOUT:

- Variety includes a display of yellow, orange and red flowers.
- Suitable for gardens bed, hanging baskets and planters. Nasturtium flowers are edible with a light peppery taste.

Community Gardens

There are over 100 community garden plots located throughout the rural and urban communities of RMWB.

The local community gardens grow fruit, vegetables and flowers and are managed by community members, churches and schools.





Fort McMurray Flower Facts

- Hardiness Zone: 3A (-40°F to -35°F)
- Growing season: about 60 days
- Last spring frost occurs around June 15
- First fall frost occurs around August 26



Best Crop Selection:

- Shade/sun: Greens: Spinach, Arugula, lettuce
- Sun: Beets, peas, carrots, beans, squash
- Container gardens: Herbs, potatoes, tomatoes, strawberries.
- Additional growing days: watermelon, corn

Flowers:

- All annuals only one year
- Perennials use the 3A zone as a guide for plants to come back yearly.

NASTURTIUM AND ARUGULA SALAD

2 C nasturtium leaves
2 C arugula leaves
12 nasturtium blossoms
4 Tbsp olive oil
1 small clove garlic, minced
2 Tbsp cider vinegar
1 tsp honey
1 Tbsp finely chopped chives
Salt and pepper to taste

Combine nasturtium leaves, arugula and nasturtium blossoms. Whisk remaining ingredients together and lightly toss with the leaves and flowers.
