## 18. What is the community need that the event will address?

The Imagination Library is a powerful program that does not just send books to families, it highlights the importance of reading to your young child. The more books children are exposed to the better they will do when entering school, more confidence, larger vocabulary and this will help kids do better at school with less struggle. The impact this program has had in 10 years for the children has been noticeable in their confidence, how they express themselves and their much larger vocabulary than children have had in previous years. If they do not need to struggle early on they tend to go further in school. The correlation between poverty levels and low literacy levels makes it evident that we need to do all that we can to help children succeed in school.

This particular title Encounter is a powerful work of art that deals with reconciliation showing we are more alike than different, it is showcasing how since the program in Canada has grown they are now able to provide more aboriginal titles that Canadian. With these celebrations, we can show how the books have helped young children that received them and highlight the program to newer families with young ones. Plus highlight the bond between child and loving caregiver is the best connections for them to get all the great out of any story and how doing that every month with a new book and continuously reading the prior ones, makes their child all the more ready for success in their life.

## 19. How was the need determined?

There was a town hall meeting in 2008, with key stakeholders in the community to discuss if this program had any merit in our community. The 3 main thoughts from this gathering were that this community would benefit immensely from this program because of these points:

- -Shift worker communities, that long hours spent away from family that a book mailed to their house would be a big benefited and would have more likely hood of parents/caregivers reading to their children.
- -Similarily we have many remote areas that can't always receive many programs due to travel. These books with great reading tips and ideas in the back would get to these hard to reach communities.
- -Many people living here do not have a very high level of education, by reading to children at a young age, they would have a better probably to get to higher level of education, starting off with the exposure of up to 60 books before kindergarten that they can keep.
- -Also many families come here for opportunity but have come from away. They are wanting the best for their children and English may not be their first language but with these books they can help get the best resources for their children.
- -This program would be a huge benefit to families that are living on the margins. Books would benefit the children because the more books children have around them, the higher literacy rate they will have and help break the cycle of poverty.



## 20. How will the event address this need?

These events will highlight what the community program is and how beneficial it is. Plus hearing aboriginal titles like Encounters a book that was written to help with reconciliation, will showcase how great this program is they receive plus help show people how best to use it. It will show the milestones the children that have received and those newly born will be reminded of this program and the benefits to their babies and little children.

## 21. What will be the positive impacts to the community?

Working with with the ECMap (Early Child Development Mapping Project) results that were poor in the southern part of the Wood Buffalo region. 51.0% of children in this area are struggling in one area of development and 27.5% of children are struggling in more than one area of development. The north region was not able to have data collected. This region rated in the bottom 7 of 98 communities. Working with Early Years Coalition and the goals to help children be successful, reading to your children will help these kids do better. By having an anniversary party it highlights that they have the program and shows the affect it can have on helping their children succeed in life.

#### 1. INCORPORATION AND NATURE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Rotary Club of Fort McMurray (the "Organization") was incorporated under the Business Corporations Act of Alberta and is Exempt from income taxes under section 149(1)(I) of the Income Tax Act.

### 3. DUE FROM ROTARY LINKS @ WOOD BUFFALO INC.

Advances to Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo are unsecured, non-interest bearing and due on demand.

## 4. INVESTMENT IN ROTARY LINKS @ WOOD BUFFALO INC.

Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo Inc., is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Organization. Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo Inc.'s mandate is to construct a public golf course that is available for the enjoyment of the community in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo ("RMWB"). The Organization's financial statements do not include the accounts of Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo Inc., which is 100% controlled by the Organization.

Rotary Links golf course occupies 174 acres of land in the Henning Ridge area of Fort McMurray. The land is under lease from Alberta Infrastructure for \$1 per year for 25 years with an option to extend the original lease term for an additional 25 years.

Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo Inc.'s long-term debt includes \$4,724,074 (as of October 31, 2016) due to Baseball Wood Buffalo Trust and Baseball Fort McMurray. Debt is payable in interest only payments of 7% per annum and is secured by a mortgage of leasehold interest in the Golf Course Lands, a general security agreement over all present and after acquired assets of the organization, a general assignment of rents with principal payments to commence upon the earlier of the 5th anniversary of the first advancement or commencement of golf course operations. Security for the loan comprises non-charitable assets only, charitable assets are excluded.

The Rotary Club of Fort McMurray and the Rotary Links @ Wood Buffalo Inc. are stated as co-borrowers of the Baseball Wood Buffalo Trust loan and therefore the debt is repayable by both organizations.

## 5. SALINE CREEK LIMITED PARTNERSHIP (SCLP)

Saline Creek Limited Partnership (the "Partnership") was incorporated under the Alberta Partnership Act on April 13, 2011.

The Partnership is formed to carry on the business of the acquisition, subdivision, servicing, marketing, leasing and management of land. The Limited Partnership is managed by Saline Creek Developments Inc., the General Partner. Under the terms of the Partnership agreement, the profits of the Limited Partnership shall be allocated to the Class A Limited Partners proportionate to the number of Class A units held by each Limited Partner until such time as the Class A Limited Partners have had profit allocated to them equal to their subscription price. Thereafter, the net income from the Limited Partnership shall be allocated 70% to the Class A unit holders and 30% to the Class B unit holders (only the Organization holds Class B units). All losses of the Partnership shall be allocated to the Class A Limited Partnership units proportionate to each Class A Limited Partners' Class A Limited Partnership Holdings.

As part of the limited partnership agreements, the Organization was given \$450,000 credit for studies done to date, and \$1,450,000 credit in recognition of the lease termination value. The \$450,000 was supported by historical costs incurred by the club and the \$1,450,000 was based on the cash flows from the camp ground.

Per the Partnership agreements the Class A contributions are to be repaid first. In addition, the Organization is exempt from any additional future contributions.

Grant revenue has been received from both the Alberta Ministry of Culture's Major Community Facilities Program Grant and the RMWB.

The Organization was entitled to receive from Keyano and the Government of Alberta "Oversizing" revenues for future developments which would tie into the Rotary Links storm water ponds. Those future receivables from Keyano and the undeveloped Government of Alberta lands were assigned to the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo in exchange for a \$2.2 million dollar payment which was received in fiscal 2016.

The Organization received a \$3,927,000 capital grant from the RMWB in 2017.
