Although Scouting is youth led, the Scouters work as guides to the youth for activities and regular meetings while the group committee manages the group and makes sure that everything is running as smoothly as it can be.

Smaller events like Tar Kar Rallies require less funds so we use the money from selling Scout Popcorn which we do every year.
